These new classes are part of the organization's initiative to further its mission to provide art education in the Rochester, NY community. The Flower City Arts Center is celebrating 50 years in 2020 and is incorporated as a 501(c)3 not-for-profit educational institution and an Institutional Member of the National Guild for Community Arts Education.
